

# A BIBLIOGRAPHY OF THE ZOOLOGY OF TENNESSEE

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The following is intended to be a contribution toward a complete bibliography of papers, monographs, and other publications relating directly or indirectly to the Zoology of the State of Tennessee and adjoining regions. Many of the publications listed might properly be considered contributions on ecology and distribution of animal forms rather than on the general taxonomy of a group. The general headings are not rigidly arranged and several of the papers listed might well be placed in several of these groups. The compiler feels, however, that the list contains the more important and useful zoological papers on the region. It is hoped that this list may be of use to investigators in the southeastern states, and that it may serve as a foundation bibliography for biological survey work in Tennessee. The majority of investigators and teachers throughout Tennessee would doubtless welcome the publication of other more specialized lists of papers dealing with the zoology and botany of this region, and it is hoped that complete reference lists will eventually become available through the medium of this journal to provide a cumulative biological bibliography.

In this list the symbols (T) and (V) indicate references available in the libraries of the University of Tennessee at Knoxville, and in those of Vanderbilt University in Nashville.<sup>1</sup> A list of the publications in the library of the Tennessee Academy of Science has already been made available (this journal, Vol. 10, No. 2, pp. 121-124, April, 1935).

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PROCEEDINGS OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE OF THE TENNESSEE ACADEMY OF SCIENCE AND THE TRUSTEES OF THE REELFOOT LAKE BIOLOGICAL STATION

*April, 1935, Meeting.* A joint meeting of the Executive Committee and the Board of Trustees of the Reelfoot Lake Biological Station was held in the biological laboratory of the Station at noon April 27, 1935. President George M. Hall presided. Others present were: Dr. William Litterer, Albert F. Ganier, Peyton N. Rhodes, John T. McGill, Richard G. Turner, and A. Richard Bliss, Jr., Director of the Biological Station. Twenty-six new active members and one sustaining member, Robert P. Mitchell of Union City, were elected.

The Secretary-Treasurer reported on the financial condition of the Academy and the Biological Station. The present status of the new appropriation for the Academy now being considered by the legislature was discussed but no action was taken. Other minor matters were also discussed.
